HIST 115 Introduction to the History of Sexuality (Surrey)

Uses lectures, music, film and images to explore the beliefs and social practices through which sexual identities are created and transformed over time. Introduces some of the main theories and concepts used in the field. (2 hour lectures/1 hour tutorials[5contact hours]). Lectures: F 10:30 - 12:20

HIST 130 Fundamentals of World History (Harbour Centre -SFUNOW)

A survey of the history of the world, with a focus on global historical phenomena of the last six centuries. (2 hour lectures/1 hour tutorials [4 contact hours]) Lectures: Sa 12:30 - 14:20 Tutorials: R 12:30 - 13:20, R 13:30 - 14:20

HIST 130Fundamentals of World History (Surrey)A survey of the history of the world, with a focus on global historical phenomena of the last six
centuries. (2 hour lectures/1 hour tutorials [4 contact hours])Lectures:R 10:30 - 12:20Tutorials:R 12:30 - 13:20, R 13:30 - 14:20

HIST 146 Africa after the Transatlantic Slave Trade (Burnaby)

An introductory survey of colonization, of social, political and environmental change under colonial rule, and of the stormy history of state-society relations in Africa since independence. (2 hour lectures/1 hour tutorials [5 contact hours]).

HIST 255 China since 1800 (Harbour Centre)

A survey of the history of China from the end of the eighteenth century, when traditional Chinese society was arguably at its height of development, to the end of the twentieth century when the social revolutions promised by the Communist regime have clearly failed to materialize. The main objectives are to provide students with vocabularies and tools to understand and interpret the political, social and cultural transformations in modern China and to initiate them in the art and techniques of historical analysis. (2 hour lectures/1 hour tutorials [4 contact hours]).

HIST 401 Problems in Modern German History (Burnaby)

An examination of major debates concerning the history of late-nineteenth and twentieth century Germany. Themes may include the nature of German modernity, interpretations of the Third Reich, or German memory after the Second World War. (4 hour seminars [4 contact hours]). Seminars: M 13:30 - 17:20

HIST 439 Catholicism in Early Modern Europe (Burnaby)

An examination of the complex history of Catholicism in Europe in the period 1500-1789. By elucidating the diversity within and among institutions and religious experiences, it will challenge the traditional assumption that Catholicism constituted a religious monolith impervious to historical change. Subjects for particular focus may include historiographical approaches to Catholicism, the papacy, the Society of Jesus, popular religion, the role of art. (4 hour seminars [4 contact hours]). HIST 458W Problems in LA Regional History (Harbour Centre)

Advanced concepts and methodology applied to the study of one or more Latin American regions. Examples are: pre-Columbian and colonial Middle America; revolutionary Mexico 1910-1970, Brazil from Slavery to Militarism, frontier society to hyper-urbanism in the La Plata countries. (4 hour seminars [4 contact hours]).

HIST 485 Studies in History I (Burnaby)

Special Topics in History* (4 hour seminars).
